
2017 Lowline Journal

Collecting Steer Data

The January Newsletter continued with further 'HOW TO...' tips to assist our members.

January included –

'Instructions to Simplify your Cattle Registrations' These can now be found on the website – FORMS & DOWNLOADS/MEMBERS AREA.

Your calves can be RECORDED & then REGISTERED at a later date.

Once recorded on the ALCA database that animal DOESN'T need to be added to a Cattle Registration Form again to register.

Just email the ALCA Office & let them know the details of the animal to be upgraded to a FULL REGISTRATION (eg. Name, ID number, DOB). A payment of \$30 (+ GST) will be required to upgrade the animal on the database.

'Kai is 11 and he wants to donate a steer and heifer (lowline x angus) from his commercial herd to a family who lost stock in the fires.

He breeds and shows Lowlines and has asked if there is someone who would like these two commercials.

They are halter broken, still on mum at the moment and will be ready to wean in a few months, Kai has said that this will give the farmers time to fix their fences.

He would like to deliver them himself. His stud name is Little Farm Lowlines.

EDIT:Saturday - Kai has been inundated with calls & messages. He & his family have now found a new family for the animals.'

Kai's story has gone viral worldwide via Facebook.

2017 Seymour Alternative Farm Expo

The Seymour Alternative Farm Expo three day event was held at King's Park, Seymour in Victoria from 17th – 19th February.

This is an extremely popular annual event and attracts people from all walks of life, from city slickers to tree changers and commercial farmers. Some people travel hours just to get there.

Wanamara Farm took Lowlines for their display with 22 month old bull, Wanamara Cavalier and young cow, Wanamara Ruby Sunset, who came out of retirement for the event. Ruby had her 7 month old bull calf at foot, Wanamara Consentino, who enjoyed being the centre of attention.

Over the three days, Greg & Julie Knight chatted with many visitors interested in their farm and their Lowlines – some with established farms and some looking for a 'tree change' in the future.

Due to the great Spring season last year in Victoria, there was a very positive atmosphere, with many keen enquiries about Lowlines, which will be difficult to fill if they all come back for cattle.

Vaccinating Your Cattle

If you have cattle, they will need annual vaccinations at some time during the year.

The most common vaccination vital to the health of your cows is a '5 in 1' or a '7 in 1' vaccination which will prevent the most common Clostridial diseases that can occur in cattle - Tetanus, Blackleg, Malignant Oedema, Botulism, Enterotoxaemia (Pulpy Kidney) & Black's Disease.


Calves usually need their first vaccination after 4 weeks old & then a 2nd Booster vaccination at a later date, before weaning. This 1st & 2nd vaccination will apply to all vaccines administered to a calf. From then on, the vaccinations will be annual. Check directions on vaccine packaging for correct timing of vaccinations. It is most important to make sure a bull calf has been fully vaccinated before he is steered (castrated).


It is very important that you have good holding facilities, either a crush or head bale to ensure that vaccinations can be done safely. The safety of the owner and the cow is imperative.



- STEP 1 Read the instructions on the package to make sure the correct dosage is given.
- Ideally use 16 gauge x ½ inch long STEP 2 needles, but longer will be OK if carefull
 - Change needles regularly as they get blunt after a few animals





Use 16 g 1/2" needles Change needles regularly




Sterilize equipment before use & check for operational efficiency


- STEP 3 Make sure your equipment is sterilized if using an automatic vaccination gun.
 - Check the gun is calibrated & working
 - If using individual needles & syringes, they are already sterile in their packages.







- Insert needle under the raised skin into the area between the skin & muscle
- Inject the vaccine under the skin & remove the needle

Lacey wants young women to break down barriers in ag

Lacey Smith, the Agricultural prefect at Rockhampton Girls Grammar school shares her ideas about breaking stereotypes of women in the ag industry



WATCHING her mum manage cattle stations all her life has given Lacey Smith the strong belief women can do anything.

Especially when it comes to the agriculture industry.

And now the Rockhampton Girls Grammar Year 12 boarding student wants to share that belief with other young women.

In her final year of school, Lacey has been awarded ag science prefect and intends to use her role as a leader to break down stereotypes of women in the agricultural industry.

She says she wants to promote the fact there are "so many careers in ag, especially for girls".

Coming from a 52,000-hectare property near Alpha and Springsure with 300 mainly droughtmaster breeders, Lacey runs a committee every three weeks for young women who are interested in ag at the school.

"I'd really like to try and get the girls to promote to the school that there are so many careers in ag, especially for women. It's not just working on the farm, there's a lot more to it and there is a lot of opportunity for girls in that career," she said. "Especially seeing the ag prefects before me. I have got some ideas from them and built on what they have done.

"We would probably just like to run (an event) or something that can promote the careers, maybe try and get some guest speakers in from all different aspects from the ag industry."

Lacey has grown so passionate about women in the agricultural industry, all thanks to her mother.

"Well because my mum is a manager of a property, I don't think you see that often and I want to get it out there that you can do that stuff," she said.

Postscript: An inspiring young lady, Lacey is a member of the Rockhampton Girls Grammar Cattle Team. They have a show team of Lowline cattle that they exhibit at many local & national shows in Queensland.

They will also be useful for breed promotion so you can tell prospective buyers exactly what meat yield or dressing percentage your cattle produce. This is what buyers want to know!

Collecting Steer Data

As part of the Producer Agreement with ALCA for Certified Lowline Beef, CLB producers are asked to submit steer carcass data with ALCA.

This data is being collected and collated, and will be used as promotion for Lowline beef and promoting the commercial use of Lowlines.

Members are asked to submit any data they have collected to add to this database. The more data collected, the more accurate the results will be.

The main information being collected is -

- Animal type: Steer/heifer
- Breeding (eg. Lowline/Lowline crossbred)
- Parent names or sire (if using Lowline bull)
- Age
- Liveweight (if known)
- Carcass Weight (from Kill sheet/butcher)
- Dressing % (if you know Liveweight)
- Meat Yield %
 (weight of meat produced once boned out ask butcher to weigh packed meat or weigh packs at home)

Meat Yield % can be calculated -

Meat weight

Carcass Weight X 100 = Meat Yield %

If you know the Liveweight of your animal before being processed, you can also work out Dressing Percentage, which is the percent of the live animal that ends up as carcass

Some factors may affect the results for Dressing %, eg. if the animal was weighed with a full stomach or empty.

Carcass Weight

Liveweight X 100 = Dressing %



All of this information is valuable but if you don't have it all, send what you do have.
