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Wanamara Farm - Lowline Beef Day

Wanamara Farm Lowline Beef Day was held on-farm on Sunday 7th May at Major Plains in Victoria. The event was sponsored by ALCA in support of its Victorian members.

The purpose of the day was to help members who were interested in beef production to understand the various avenues for selling animals, including the opportunity of selling animals to Paddock to Table Butchery in Laverton.

The day was focused on helping breeders to understand what is necessary to enable them to achieve the best possible price, wherever they chose to sell.

Using a Power Point presentation, the pros and cons were discussed for private sales, selling Lowline beef privately and through markets, private butchers, saleyards and abattoirs. Advertising stock on the ALCA website Saleyard page was also covered.

Selling to the Paddock to Table Butchery in Laverton with the opportunity of establishing a continual market for their animals was discussed at length and was thought to be advantageous by many of those attending.

The process of castrating bull calves, assessing cattle body condition, where to find further information regarding animal husbandry practices, what ALCA CLB tools are available to members & the need for cattle scales were also covered. One participant commented as he was leaving 'I can see I need to purchase some cattle scales!'

We had a great response to the event. For some participants, this was the first ALCA event they have attended. We had 18 people attending with a few more unable to attend on the day due to family illness. Two people each travelled over 5 and 6 hours to get there, which shows commitment.





Lowline rump steak and sausages from a Wanamara steer previously sold to Paddock to Table was served for the BBQ lunch.

The Beef Day was open to ALCA & non-ALCA members and advertised to the public through the Australian Lowline Discussion Group Facebook page.

Participants took home an ALCA 'show bag' containing promotional material as well as printed copies of information discussed on the day. A Lucky Door prize donated by Wanamara Farm was a highlight for the winner who had begun his day at 5am that morning to attend from 5 hours away.

The Beef Day was a great success for being both educational and supportive for members as well as a very friendly social event which everyone enjoyed.

It has also established a network for Lowline beef producers in Victoria.

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Identification of Calves for Recording or Registration

For many members, calving season will be starting soon and it is an exciting time!

It is important for calves to be given the correct identification in order for them to be recorded or registered on the ALCA database.

Each animal is given its own unique identification which should include the Herd prefix of the breeder (Member ID), the Year Letter and a 3 digit number.

Calf numbers are allocated consecutively as they are born regardless of whether they will be registered or not. The numeric sequence continues in following years – it does not return to 001 at the commencement of each year.

The individual calf number can be any number from 001 to 999 but no two animals can have the same identification number.

Example: ABCU105

Breeder Herd Prefix - ABC

Year Letter for 2023 - U

Individual Number - 105

(the next calf number will be 106)

For new members, the first calf born on your property should be given the 3 digit number of 001. The next calf will be 002, and so on.


Tattooing

Most Agricultural Societies require animals to be ear tattooed in order for them to be exhibited at shows.

The **Herd** (stud) **prefix** is imprinted into the animal's **right ear** so that it can be read upright from the front.

The **year letter and individual calf number** is imprinted into the animal's left ear.

In the example below, the right ear has been tattooed with the Herd (stud) prefix of XYZ and the tattoo in the left ear is D002. Thus the full ear tattoo of the example calf is XYZ D002. It is recommended that this be done using a green paste to allow for easier reading of tattoos.



The year letter is not specific to Australian Lowlines and is the same numbering system as used by many breeds of cattle.

2023 Year Letter is U
2024 Year Letter will be V
2025 Year Letter will be W
2026 Year Letter will be Y
(NB – the letters I, O and X are not used as Year Letters in this system)

As required by the relative country, the NLIS tag (Australia) or NAIT tag (New Zealand) will also be required to be present in the ear of the animal. These tags enable lifetime traceability for all animals whether they are show or paddock animals.

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New Zealand Report

The Australian Lowline breed is represented in New Zealand by the North Island and South Island Lowline Promotion Groups, effectively branches of the home breed society, the Australian Lowline Cattle Association.

Here in New Zealand, members were pleased to get back into showing in the 2022-2023 season, with South Island exhibitors participating at Rangiora (October), the New Zealand Agricultural Show (November), Malvern (March) and Oxford (April).

It was great to see the young cattle handlers out in the show ring again for their parading and stock-judging events, and to have the breed once more in the public eye.

Hillary Cooper, the winner of the Senior Herdsperson and Lady Isaac Scholarship at the NZ Ag Show, participated in and competed at the 2023 Royal Sydney Easter Show in New South Wales, Australia, as part of the Cann Valley Lowline team from Victoria. A big thanks to Matt Cooney for making a hands-on place in his Cann Valley team. As Matt said 'No worries. We're all one big team in the Australian Lowlines'.



Facebook – the North and South Island Lowline Promotion Groups have combined their presence in the 'Lowline Cattle New Zealand' page and discussion group, sharing stud and general beef and animal information.

North Island breeder – Matt Wilkinson from Rukihia – is the main driver: Thanks Matt.

After nearly three years of ZOOM meetings, our breeders have had the chance to meet up again away from the show ring. Those in the South Island had the chance of an enjoyable social catch-up over lunch at Leeston.

On March 11, the North Island group held their AGM followed by their annual Summer Field Day, attended by international guests Ross and Emma Hardy who especially travelled all the way from Hanging Rock in Victoria, Australia. Ross is also on the ALCA Council.

One of the guest speakers at the field day was Amy Hoogenboom, from Zoetis New Zealand, who emphasised the importance of breeding cattle for the markets Lowlines are establishing, the importance of weight and growth performance records, and gave some useful tips on heifer selection.

The other guest speaker was Hugh Jellie from ATA Regenerative, which is part of the Savory Institute, and he outlined some of the first steps available to breeders as they begin the journey into Regenerative Agriculture.

The field day was followed by a group dinner in Rotorua.

The first Lowline school stud in New Zealand – indeed the first outside of Australia – has been registered with Rangiora High School launching the Whakatipu Stud. They have had a successful calving with nine calves using AI straws and a follow-up bull.

Membership numbers in New Zealand now stand at 41 registered studs, 28 in the North Island and 13 in the South Island.

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Member Grievances

Dear Member,

In the event of a dispute between members (in their capacity as members) or between a member and the Association, the Australian Lowline Cattle Association's (ALCA) Constitution details a dispute resolution process.

Where do I get for more information about this process:

Refer to the ALCA Constitution: Part A, Section 12 - Dispute Resolution. A copy of the Constitution can be found on the ALCA website under the 'Association' tab.

ALCA members are also bound by a Code of Ethics. The Code of Ethics is detailed in the Association Bylaws which can also be found on the ALCA website under the 'Association' tab.

How do I make a complaint:

To commence the dispute resolution process Council must receive a written complaint from the affected member/s. The complaint must include a statement about the nature of the dispute or grievance and wherever possible provide specific details including names, date/s, and times.

Who do I contact when a dispute arises:

In the first instance contact should be made with ALCA's Executive Officer. The Executive Officer will refer the complaint to Council. Council will then investigate the complaint and provide timely feedback to the member/s involved in the dispute on the next steps in the dispute resolution process. Please be assured that all complaints will be held in the strictest confidence.

Finally, where a dispute arises, member engagement in the dispute resolution process is an important part of protecting and improving the good standing and reputation of the Australian Lowline breed, the Association and its members.
